Candidate to show an understanding of the horse's evolution and how it influences the modern horse; 55 million yrs ago, gradual change to environment. Adaptation to held horse survive; Sensitive hearing, large eyes, fast reflexes, speed, herd instinct for bonding/protection, good memory, digestive system travel long distances for food (don't have to lie down/chew cud like cow)		
Candidate to have an understanding of how to manage the flight response; Is an instinct to keep horse safe from predators. Involves horses' legs moving quickly/gaining control reduces flight response & stress		
Candidate to discuss the three parts of pressure- release; Light aid, stronger aid and release (thank you)		
Candidate to discuss reward training with scratching/food, punishment enforces bad behaviour/frightened and habituation getting used to things; loudspeakers, tack, being ridden, sound of cars in more detail than for D Certificate		
Rider to discuss classical conditioning; A stimulus; sound or smell, becomes associated with a reflex or learned response. (ie Sound of car arriving means getting fed)

Candidate to demonstrate and discuss two-point and three-point position; discuss when to use these positions		
Candidate to demonstrate balanced riding over poles, both single and in sequence		
Candidate to negotiate small show jumps and cross- country fences with height and width 65cm
