Candidate to understand and recognises the flight response; <i>Horses will run away from things that frighten them or they feel they are in danger</i>		
Candidate to understand and explain pressure-release, reward training, punishment and habituation; <i>pressure-release is when you take away pressure for the right response, reward immediately for behaviour you want him to do again. Punishment should be avoided before using discuss with coach. Habituation is 'getting used to'</i>

Candidate to understand the correct fitting of a noseband; <i>2 fingers between noseband and horses' nose</i>		
Candidate to demonstrate saddling and bridling a horse; <i>with assistance if necessary</i>		
Candidate to be developing a correct riding position		
Candidate to stop with accuracy; <i>use markers to test accuracy</i>		
Candidate to demonstrate clear downward and upward transitions		
Candidate to be able to explain the concept of self-carriage; <i>Self-carriage is how the pony carries himself. Test this when under saddle is for the rider to give away the reins (push their arms forward) on the long side. There should be no change in the horse's tempo (speed).</i>		
Candidate to demonstrate correct turns and riding on straight lines (between two points)		
Candidate to show an understanding of rising diagonals		
Candidate to demonstrate canter in an enclosed arena		
Candidate to demonstrate and complete a basic ridden dressage test (Page 33 or 28 D* Manual)		

Candidate to understand and discuss some mounted games		
Candidate to know how to ride on the road, traffic rules including hand signals		
Candidate to demonstrate crest release		
Candidate to walk and trot over poles		
Candidate to negotiate small jumps with maximum height and width 45cm

Candidate to understand the Five Freedoms of horse welfare; <i>1. hunger & thirst, 2. Discomfort, 3. pain, injury & disease, 4. express natural behaviours, 5. fear & distress</i>		
Candidate to identify parts of the horse; <i>throat, elbow, pastern, dock, coronet, hips, hock, stifle, ribs & cheek</i>		
Candidate to demonstrate the correct way to brush a tail		
Candidate to identify four parts of the hoof; <i>wall, sole, frog, heels</i>		
Candidate to discuss correct hoof management practices; <i>daily care (pick out, oil etc), regular farrier</i>		
Candidate to have knowledge of feeding and living conditions and the daily horse checklist; <i>water, fences, gates, pasture rug, horse</i>		
Candidate to have knowledge of signs of a healthy horse; <i>Bright, interested, shiny coat, well covered, nostrils & eyes clear no discharge, breathing regular, 8-12 manures, light coloured urine, healthy appetite</i>		
Candidate to describe four common illnesses or minor injuries; <i>girth gall, cold, colic, laminitis</i>		
Candidate to discuss correct management of saddlery; <i>stitching, cleaning, wet gear</i>		
Candidate to identify following items of tack; <i>bridle, bit, reins, cheek strap, brow band, nose band, throat lash, saddle, girth, stirrups, pommel, leathers, seat, crupper, surcingle, cantle, waist, gullet, stirrup bar, sweat flap</i>
